Iowa's Direct Care and Support Curriculum

Prepare to Care – Iowa's Direct Care and Support Curriculum is a comprehensive, cross-discipline training package that prepares people to work in a variety of direct care settings. The curriculum includes a Core training course, which provides basic foundational knowledge and an introduction to the profession, and five advanced training courses.

Advanced certificates as a Community Living Professional, Personal Support Professional, or Health Support Professional are achieved by taking a written exam at any Iowa community college after completion of required courses. ⁴⁴ Our feedback from our providers that attended was that it was our best training yet, so to me that was a testimony of the quality of the curriculum. How Does Prepare to Care Benefit Employers of Direct Care Professionals?

Prepare to Care training was developed by employers, direct care professionals, and educators to address the knowledge base needed to serve people in the broad array of programs and settings. Its quality and effectiveness were proven through pilot projects and formal evaluation.

- · Employers benefit in many ways!
 - » Well-trained staff who are prepared to work in all direct care settings
 - » Standardized curriculum that provides a clear understanding of the workers' education and skills
 - » Flexibility in training using standard curriculum for initial and continuing education
 - » Improve retention of direct care professionals
 - » Reduce staff turnover
 - » Reduce re-training and associated costs
 - » Create economies of scale in training through partnerships
 - » Opportunity to hire direct care professionals who have already completed core training and Advanced Training Certificates

Key Findings

In a pilot study, employers experienced up to a 59% reduction in turnover rates after implementing the Prepare to Care Training.

Compared to a control group, Prepare to Care students were more likely to feel they had opportunities for advancement in their agencies and less likely to report heavy workloads.

More than 90% of students say they are satisfied with the training.

• Employers have options in delivering Prepare to Care training. The curriculum and design of delivery systems utilize traditional sources for training direct care professionals: employers and community colleges. Prepare to Care instructors must have completed instructor training and be accepted as an instructor.

- » Prepare to Care training is available statewide.
- » Training can be delivered through in-house instructors or through community colleges.
- » Training, since it is standardized, can enhance the learning environment for direct care professionals through delivery by partnerships among employers or between employers and a community college.
- » Instructors are trained in content and adult learning techniques so sessions are effective.
- » Instructors have access to all curriculum and support materials as well as on-line networking and other resources.

How Does Prepare to Care Training Work?

Prepare to Care training makes it easy for direct care professionals to pursue a career path of their choice through the way the curriculum and training are organized. The curriculum consists of the introductory Core training plus the five advanced training modules.

Advanced Training Modules

- CORE Core – Basic foundational knowledge and introduction to the profession. Estimated course length: 6 hours Home & Community Living – Services to enhance or maintain independence, access community supports and HCL services, and achieve personal goals. Estimated course length: 13 hours Instrumental Activities of Daily Living – Services to assist an individual with daily living tasks to function IADL independently in a home or community setting. Estimated course length: 11 hours Personal Support – Services to support individuals as they perform personal activities of daily living. Estimated course length: 9 hours Personal Activities of Daily Living - Services to assist an individual in meeting their basic needs. PADL Estimated course length: 48 hours нмм
 - Health Monitoring & Maintenance Services that support and maintain a individual's health an provide functional support of certain conditions. Estimated course length: 27 hours

Based upon the combination of Core with other modules, an individual becomes eligible for a state-approved Advanced Training Certificate, awarded upon successful completion of an exam. Exams are proctored and offered at all lowa community colleges.
